4. In what ways are governing officials "God's servants"?

5. Is it right to criticize the actions and decisions of a governing official? If so, what principles help you remain faithful to God as you criticize? Share some specific examples.

6. Why is our response to civil authorities a part of our worship to God? How might we bring dishonor to the name of Jesus through our responses to civil authorities?

7. What special applications do we need to make in a culture of extreme disrespect for governing officials? Describe the applications you have made when President Obama was in office and the applications you make now that President Trump is in office?

8. What part does God play in putting individuals in places of governing authority? How do you square this with the fact that many of those individuals govern in a way that denies God and that harms people?

9. What do you think about capital punishment? Why do you have this view?

10. Does this passage give any biblical insight to the morality of capital punishment? If so, what insight is offered here?
